



## Fact Sheet for Faculty and Students


**Our state has passed a law to become a member of the enhanced Nurse Licensure Compact (eNLC). Please take a moment to read the information below about how licensure is changing in our state and what you need to do to prepare for this.**

### Here is what you need to know:

- Nurses who reside in states that are members of the eNLC can acquire a multistate license.
- The multistate license allows you to practice physically, electronically and/or telephonically in our state and other states that are members of the eNLC.
- Those who currently hold a **STATE** nursing license and want a multistate license must apply for one through the Board of Nursing website.
- On the application for a multistate license, you will be required to declare your state of residency. This is the state you consider to be your home and where you pay taxes.
- There are additional requirements for a multistate license. These are called "Uniform Licensure Requirements (ULRs)." If you do not meet all the ULRs, you will retain your single state license. If you need to practice across a state border, you can do so by applying for a single state license in that state (or using an active license that has been issued to you by that state.)
- If you practice in other eNLC states on your multistate license, you must adhere to the laws and regulations of the state you are practicing in.
- If you need to practice in a state that is not a member of the eNLC, you need a single state license issued from that state regardless of whether you hold a multistate license.
- If you are uncertain about whether you need a license to care for a patient - remember, your practice takes place where the patient is located. If the patient is located in another state, you need to be licensed to practice in that state.
