2020 Regulatory Achievement Award. The North Carolina Board of Nursing's history as a regulatory leader goes back to 1903 when North Carolina became the first state to pass legislation regarding nurse licensing. It subsequently became the first state to have a nurse practice act and the first to approve APRNs to prescribe medication.

The board continues to advance regulatory excellence by consistently scoring among the top tier of nursing boards nationwide, demonstrating efficiency in education, licensing, practice, and investigations. The board exemplifies NCSBN's mission by providing education, service, and research with a collaborative spirit.

The executive management of the board encourages staff to look beyond the state's borders for opportunities to interact with and learn from others. Committed to building strong relationships, learning from diverse thinking and working with others, the board collaborates with several regulatory organizations and boards. Widely recognized for its expertise, North Carolina's alternative program served as a model for the Office of Emergency Medical Services Chemical Dependency Monitoring program.

The North Carolina Physical Therapy Board also enlisted the Board of Nursing to monitor its alternative program participants. In just the last five years, board members and staff have served and continue to serve on the NCSBN board of directors and more than 16 committees. At the state level, board staff are also active committee participants.

North Carolina was 1 of 9 states selected for a grant to build a more highly educated nursing workforce and increase baccalaureate nurses. The grant helped to combine community college AD nursing programs and university BSN programs. The board has supported and showed leadership in promoting safe, effective nursing practice through its participation and numerous NCSBN projects.

It was one of 22 states that contributed to the Taxonomy of Error, Root Cause Analysis and Practiceresponsibility or TERCAP. It is also one of the leading TERCAP contributors, having submitted more than 500 cases since 2012. The North Carolina Board of Nursing is an invaluable and significant contributor to the mission and vision of NCSBN and a model of regulatory excellence.

For that, the board was honored with the Regulatory Achievement Award in 2020.
